

## Understanding Metropolitan Vancouver's Shelter System

1. Year-round Shelter Beds	
<b>Description</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Provide temporary accommodation for homeless individuals and families.</li> <li>• Provide support services such as food, clothing, counselling and referrals to other services or longer term housing.</li> </ul>
<b>Funding</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• BC Housing</li> <li>• Homelessness Partnering Strategy (formerly NHI) in partnership with the Regional Steering Committee on Homelessness (RSCH) and Aboriginal Homelessness Steering Committee (AHSC).</li> <li>• Others (private funders).</li> </ul>
<b>Regional Bed Count</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Approximately 900 year-round shelter beds in Metropolitan Vancouver.</li> </ul>
2. Cold/Wet Weather Shelter Beds (Seasonal)	
<b>Description</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Operated on a seasonal basis generally from October/November to March/April.</li> <li>• Support services are provided on a more limited basis than in year-round shelters.</li> </ul>
<b>Funding</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Homelessness Partnering Strategy in partnership with the RSCH and AHSC.</li> <li>• Private funders.</li> </ul>
<b>Regional Bed Count</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Approximately 100 CWW shelter beds and mats provided in Metropolitan Vancouver.</li> </ul>
3. Extreme Weather Response Shelter Spaces	
<b>Description</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Provides extra shelter spaces for homeless people during periods of extreme winter weather.</li> <li>• Heavily dependent on volunteers with limited support services provided.</li> <li>• A crisis response to extreme weather occurrences, to augment ongoing shelter programs.</li> </ul>
<b>Funding</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• BC Housing</li> <li>• Homelessness Partnering Strategy in partnership with the RSCH and AHSC.</li> <li>• Others (non-profits, private funders).</li> </ul>
<b>Regional Bed Count</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Approximately 600 additional shelter spaces.</li> <li>• 8 EWR plans are in place covering 13 municipalities.</li> </ul>

The Plan has guided the provision of services and shelter to people who are homeless or at-risk of homelessness in Metropolitan Vancouver since 2000.  <p><b>Aboriginal Homelessness Steering Committee</b></p>	<p>The Aboriginal Homelessness Steering Committee is an inclusive committee of organizations working to coordinate the regional response to homelessness in the Aboriginal community. The AHSC makes funding recommendations under the Homelessness Partnering Strategy's Urban Aboriginal Homelessness funding stream.  <p><b>Greater Vancouver Shelter Strategy</b></p>	<p>The Greater Vancouver Shelter Strategy (GVSS) is a regional network of organizations working together to meet the needs of people who are homeless or at risk.  <p><b>Extreme Weather Response</b></p>	<p>The Extreme Weather Response is an emergency response to prevent harm to homeless people resulting from extreme weather.
