## HOMELESSNESS: A PRIMER FOR BUSINESS INFOSHEET #3

### Sharps Disposal<sup>1</sup>

There are 2 options to dispose of a discarded syringe:

1. Contact the Purpose Society mobile health van 604-351-1885 for syringe recovery and disposal
2. Self-disposal:
  - i.) Find a rigid plastic container with a secure lid  
Options:
    - ◆ sharps container – available free from Purpose Society mobile health van, the Tri-Cities Public Health Unit 200-205 Newport Drive, Port Moody, or ask your local pharmacy if they provide free sharps containers
    - ◆ pop bottle or liquid laundry bottle
  - ii.) Remove the lid and place the container on the ground beside the syringe. Do not break or recap the needle.
  - iii.) Pick up the syringe by the centre of the barrel. Use latex gloves or tongs, if available. Always point the sharp end of the syringe down and away from you.
  - iv.) Do not hold the container in your hand. Put the syringe in the container sharp-end first and secure the lid
  - v.) Safely dispose of container:  
Options:
    - ◆ Purpose Society mobile health van 604-351-1885
    - ◆ Share Community & Family Services 2615 Clarke St, Port Moody –blue sharps disposal bin (mailbox size) located outside against the west wall of the building (will accept sharps or sharps containers)
    - ◆ Tri-Cities Public Health Unit 200-205 Newport Drive, Port Moody
    - ◆ Ask your local pharmacy if they provide free sharps disposal services
  - vi.) Wash hands thoroughly with soap and water.

If you are poked or scratched by a needle:

- ◆ Don't panic. The risk of infection is low. There are no reports of HIV infection following a needle stick injury in the community.
- ◆ Wash the affected area with soap and water. Do not squeeze.
- ◆ Seek medical attention immediately.
